Apprenticeship is a time-honored approach to training skilled workers through a combination of on-the job training and classroom instruction.

Apprenticeship is an agreement through which the apprentice gains instruction and support in exchange for work. The apprentice learns with masters of the trade, craft, or profession and begins an occupational career while contributing to the productivity of the company.

The tradition of classroom and on-the-job training is embedded in a full range of over 1100 occupations in the United States and around the world. In every apprenticed occupation, the apprentice is instructed and supported at the same time he or she works. Student apprenticeship is contextualized learning in a specific career area or skilled occupation, which will prepare the student for post-secondary education or advanced placement within a Registered Apprenticeship Program.*

Nearly all careers in a skilled trade in Ohio begin with an apprenticeship.

Apprenticeships: Key Facts





Nearly all skilled trades require some form of an apprenticeship to advance.



Apprentices are employees who are paid to learn skills that enhance their employment prospects.



Each apprenticeship occupation has its own standard training outline that details the training and instruction required.



A graduated pay scale assures that salary reflects the degree of skill achieved.



An apprentice operates under the close supervision of a skilled worker on the job and takes related classroom instruction at night or on weekends.





The best first step to take is to determine what your students' interests are and better understand their end goals after graduation.

There are many career options within construction, and each requires different training and skills. Exploring career options can help narrow down next steps, as there is no single path to a career in construction. Use the I Build America - Ohio website to read about various trades help your child explore where they see themselves in 5, 10, or even 15 years. This doesn't have to be an "end all, be all" career choice. This decision will simply guide next steps, which varies depending on your child's age and experience level.

- High School Students have the opportunity to learn a trade while working toward a high school
 diploma at a career technical center or joint vocational center. There, they can work toward their next
 step with college credit that can be used toward your degree or relevant experience for an
 apprenticeship to immediately earn as you learn as soon as you graduate.
- High School Graduates have two paths to take: enroll in a post-secondary college, technical institute, or certificate program - OR - begin an apprenticeship. Ohioans in every region can find a local opportunity nearby, both in and out of the classroom.

Use the I Build America - Ohio website Apprenticeship interactive map (https://www.ibuildamerica-ohio.com/training/apprenticeships/) to look at the Apprenticeship programs located near the students' home.



Using the map's results, explore the programs, companies, and opportunities for beginning a career in construction. Students can work through a local union or they can be hired by companies directly.



Each company has their own preferences between direct hiring or recruiting from unions. The best way to know where to start for a specific job is call a local company or union and speak with their hiring manager.



Apprenticeships begin throughout the year, though there is usually a big push in the spring before the busy summer season. Encourage your students to dream big about their goals, show up on time, and be ready to learn on the job!
